City of Clarkston Unveils \$100,000 Grant Opportunity to Support Nonprofit Organizations Making a Difference

Earlier this year, the City of Clarkston proudly launched the Clarkston C.A.R.E.S. (Community Assistance, Resources, Empowerment, and Support) Grant Program, a new initiative supporting nonprofit organizations that make a meaningful impact in our community. The program opened for applications on January 8, 2025, and offers up to \$10,000 per awardee to fund projects promoting education, employment, social adjustment, and health and wellness.

The inaugural application period closed on February 10, and a ranking and review committee of non-city employees is now evaluating submissions based on established criteria. We will notify awardees beginning February 25, marking the first of many opportunities for local organizations to launch impactful programs. A second grant cycle is planned for later this year, continuing the city's commitment to supporting community-driven initiatives.

Through two grant cycles annually, the Clarkston C.A.R.E.S. Grant Program will provide ongoing opportunities for local nonprofits to address pressing needs and drive positive change across Clarkston.

Interim City Manager Tammi Saddler Jones shared her enthusiasm for the program's potential.

"Clarkston has always been a city where diversity thrives, and our strength lies in the collective efforts of our community. The Clarkston C.A.R.E.S. Grant is an important step in reinforcing this vision by investing in organizations deeply embedded in our community and sharing our commitment to growth, sustainability, and resilience. We can't wait to see the creative and impactful initiatives this funding will help bring to life."

Mayor Beverly H. Burks also highlighted the program's impact.



Clarkston Selected to Develop City Agriculture Plan with \$75,000 Grant

Food Well Alliance and Atlanta Regional Commission to Support Local Food Access and Urban Agriculture



The City of Clarkston has been selected to develop the region's next City Agriculture Plan. Joining East Point, Alpharetta, Jonesboro, and Austell in creating a roadmap for strengthening local food systems, this milestone, led by Food Well Alliance and the Atlanta Regional Commission, marks Clarkston as the first city in DeKalb County to embark on this initiative.


A City Agriculture Plan outlines policies and programs that help communities increase access to locally grown food over the next 3 to 5 years. Residents' input shapes these plans, which are backed by a \$75,000 implementation grant from the Food Well Alliance.

Community engagement is key to crafting a plan that reflects the needs and aspirations of Clarkston residents. There are several opportunities to get involved from February through May 2025:

- Community Survey (Feb–May 2025): Available online and in person at local hubs and events. The first 100 respondents will receive \$10.
- Community Conversations (March–April 2025): Open discussions hosted across Clarkston with community co-facilitators. The first 50 participants will receive \$25.
- Local Events: Food Well Alliance will be at various gatherings, including the Friends of Refugees Spring Festival and the Refuge Coffee Spring Market.

This colorful new mural, created by artist Teresa Abboud, transforms the pavers outside City Hall into a welcoming expression of joy and belonging. Located beside the electric vehicle charging stations, the artwork invites residents and visitors to feel at home and highlights the city's commitment to a greener future.

The project is further enhanced by thoughtfully placed benches donated by Ismaili CIVIC and the Camp Middle School Bench Project, providing spaces for people to gather, rest, and connect.

For Abboud, the mural is more than just a piece of public art. It is a reflection of the warmth and energy she sees in Clarkston.

"I wanted people to feel at home. It is colorful and happy. Just like how you decorate your home, you decorate your city. Clarkston is not just a place to pass through but a place to belong."

Originally from Lebanon, Abboud brings over two decades of artistic expertise to her work. As a DeKalb County resident, her first project in Clarkston was at Refuge Coffee, where she was immediately drawn to the city's reputation as a global village.

Her work consistently explores themes of unity, acceptance, and community, aiming to break cultural barriers and foster friendships. "Look at how much we are all alike," she says. "Once we move past fear, we can truly connect."

Beyond her murals, Abboud has a background in children's book illustration and animation. She passionately uses art to tell stories that resonate across cultures. Beyond the canvas, Abboud is the founder of Teresa Afternoon and also serves as a mentor for StartME, an entrepreneurship program that empowers local microbusinesses with guidance, funding, and resources.

Clarkston Police Department Fully Staffed: A New Era of Safety and Service



For the first time in years, the Clarkston Police Department has reached full staffing, a milestone that promises to enhance public safety, reduce response times, and strengthen community engagement. With 21 sworn officers now serving the city, the department is poised to operate at full strength and ensure the highest level of service and protection for Clarkston residents.

"This is a tremendous achievement for our department and our community," said Assistant Chief Xavier Todd. "Being fully staffed means we have the personnel necessary to provide efficient and proactive policing while allowing our officers to focus on building stronger relationships with residents."

The journey to full staffing was not without its challenges. In mid-2023, the department faced a significant officer shortage, leading to increased workloads and longer response times. Recognizing the urgency of the situation, city leadership, including the Mayor and Council, approved a salary increase from \$46,000 to \$60,000 to remain competitive with surrounding agencies.

Police Chief Christine Hudson emphasized the importance of this decision in attracting new talent. "The salary adjustment was a game-changer. It allowed us to recruit highly qualified officers who may have otherwise chosen larger departments. We also enhanced our recruitment efforts through social media, job fairs, and community outreach, which made a significant impact on getting results."

With a full complement of officers, the department can prioritize focus on proactive crime prevention, community engagement, and specialized training.

Employee of the Month: Detective Aram Saleh Brings

Heart, Experience, and Hope to Clarkston

Detective Aram Saleh's journey to the Clarkston Police Department is one of resilience, dedication, and a deep understanding of the community he now serves. In 1999, his family moved from Iraq to the United States, settling in Clarkston before relocating to Gwinnett County and later Kansas City. His path eventually led him back to Georgia, where he pursued a career in law enforcement. He served in DeKalb County and Doraville before returning to Clarkston, the city that first welcomed his family to the United States.

Detective Saleh was drawn to the Clarkston Police Department because of its diversity and the opportunity to bridge the gap between law enforcement and the city's many newcomers. With years of experience in narcotics investigations, he has played a key role in reducing crime, using his expertise to remove dangerous substances and suspects from the streets. But beyond enforcement, he is committed to building trust. He understands the fear and hesitation that some in the community feel toward police, particularly those from refugee backgrounds. That is why he makes it a priority to engage directly with residents, offering a listening ear, sharing his contact information, and ensuring that people know they can seek help without fear.

Looking ahead, Detective Saleh is passionate about mentorship and hopes to develop programs that provide Clarkston's youth with positive role models and opportunities for personal growth. He believes that giving young people an alternative to crime can change lives through internships, activities, or access to guidance.

Detective Saleh remains humble, crediting his colleagues' teamwork and dedication when asked about being named Employee of the Month. For him, the real reward comes from knowing he has made a difference in someone's life, whether by solving a case, offering assistance, or simply putting a smile on a resident's face.

He advises those looking to make a difference to break the cycle of fear, doubt, and hesitation. He encourages others to change the story, not just for themselves but also for those who come after them.

The City of Clarkston is proud to have Detective Saleh on our team, ensuring that safety, trust, and community go hand in hand.

- Steps Challenge "Walk It Off Wednesday," an employee-led group walk



residents with reliable recycling services. Proper recycling helps reduce waste, protect the environment, and ensure recyclable materials are processed correctly. This guide outlines what can and cannot be recycled to help keep our community clean and sustainable.



Clarkston Recycling Guide

Recycling Right: A Step-by-Step Guide on What Goes In and What Stays Out

PAPER

Newspapers, magazines, office paper, junk mail, paperboard (cereal boxes)



How to prep: Remove tape, staples, and plastic windows. Keep dry.



PLASTICS

Bottles and containers labeled #1 & #2 (water bottles, milk jugs, detergent bottles)



How to prep: Rinse thoroughly and remove lids and labels if possible. Do not crush bottles.



METALS

Aluminum cans (soda, beer), steel/tin cans (soup, beans, pet food)

NO scrap metal, wires, coat hangers, aerosol cans, batteries

How to prep: Rinse cans and remove labels if possible.



CARDBOARD

Corrugated boxes, non-glossy paperboard (shoe boxes, cereal boxes)

NO greasy pizza boxes, wax-coated or glossy-finished cardboard

How to prep: Flatten boxes and keep them dry and food-free.
